

OSHA Rule on Employee Representatives during an Inspection

OSHA posted a Final Rule on the Worker Walkaround Representative Designation Process that will be effective on May 31.

The rule clarifies that a non-employee representative may be reasonably necessary to conduct an effective and thorough inspection based upon skills, knowledge, or experience. The representative(s) authorized by employees may be an employee of the employer or a non-employee third party;

EPA Safer Communities by Chemical Accident Prevention

On February 27, 2024, EPA finalized revisions to the Risk Management Program (RMP) to further protect vulnerable communities from chemical accidents, especially those living near facilities in industry sectors with high accident rates.

The final rule includes new safeguards such as identifying safer technologies and chemical alternatives, requiring implementation of safeguard measures in certain cases, more thorough incident investigations, and third-party auditing.
